William & Mary's Campbell, Appalachian State's Fowlkes and Hampton's Mathis Highlight 2004 *Football Gazette* All-American Team

WESTMONT, Illinois ~~ Peyton Award winner, **Lang Campbell** from William & Mary, Southern Conference Player of the Year, **DaVon Fowlkes** from Appalachian State and record-setting, **Jerome Mathis** from Hampton headline a talented 2004 *Don Hansen's Football Gazette* NCAA 1-AA All-America team. James Madison's, **Mickey Matthews**, who led the Dukes to the NCAA Division 1-AA national championship, including a 13-2 record, was named Coach of the Year.

Campbell earned Offensive Back of the Year while Fowlkes claimed the Offensive Receiver of the Year Award and Mathis is the Special Teams Player of the Year. Senior **Cory Proctor** from the University of Montana earned Offensive Lineman of the Year honors, while **Harold Wells** from Gardner-Webb claimed Defensive Lineman of the Year honors. Cal Poly's **Jordan Beck** is the Defensive Linebacker of the year and Defensive Back of the Year honors go to **Reed Doughty** from Northern Colorado. **Rob Hunt** from North Dakota State is the 2004 recipient for the Rimington Award as the NCAA 1-AA top offensive center.** (See below)

Campbell, a senior, from Winchester, Virginia, completed 298 of 455 passes (.655) for 3,988 yards and 30 TDs with 5 INTs... carried the ball 101 times for 317 yards (3.1 ypc) and eight TDs... named as the recipient of the 2004 Payton Award. Campbell established school single-season records for passing yards (3,988), total offense (4,305) and touchdowns (30), as well as touchdowns responsible for (38, as he also had eight rushing TDs). The Winchester, VA native led William & Mary to a share of the Atlantic 10 title and its first appearance in the NCAA I-AA semifinals, along with the first 11-win season in the 111-year history of the Tribe's program. At the conclusion of the regular season, Campbell was honored as the A-10 Offensive Player of the Year, becoming the first player in the Tribe's 12-year association with the league to earn the award.

Fowlkes, a senior, from Fort Wayne, Indiana, caught 103 passes for 1,618 yards (15.7 ypc) and 14 TDs... Averaged 23.3 yards on 18 kickoff returns and 9.2 yards on 21 punt returns... had 10 carries for 82 yards and two touchdowns... 2004 Southern Conference Player of the Year. Set ASU and SoCon single-season records for receptions, receiving yards and all-purpose yards (2,313 all-purpose yards).

Mathis, a senior, from Petersburg, Virginia, returned 25 kickoffs for 888 yards (35.5 ypr) and 5 TD... Led Division I-AA with an average of 29.47 yards per catch, hauling in 29 receptions for 864 yards and nine touchdowns... set a I-AA record with five kickoff returns for touchdowns (91, 99, 92, 80, 93) and led the country with an average of 35.5 yards per return... recorded three 100-yard games on the season... set a school record with 243 yards receiving against Gardner-Webb... had 11 receptions of 30 or more yards, 10 of those resulting in touchdowns... set a school record with a 98-yard touchdown reception at South Carolina State... 173 rushing yards and two touchdowns, including a 68-yard run against Norfolk State... 1,930 all-purpose yards for an average of 160.8 yards per game, sixth best total in I-AA... ended his career with 394 all-purpose yards in a playoff game at William & Mary where he had six receptions for 188 yards and two touchdowns, four rushes for 40 yards and 166 kickoff return yards, including a 93-yard touchdown... set the school record with receptions in 34 consecutive games.

Proctor, a senior, from Gig Harbor, Washington, I-AA All-American: AP, 2nd team and Sports Network, 3rd team. 1st team All-Big Sky, 2004. Honorable mention All-league in 2003 and 2002. 2005 Hula Bowl. Started all 15 games in 2004 and 42 in a row.

Wells, a senior, from Lilburn, Georgia, recorded 86 tackles with 22.5 TFLs (-74 yds) including 7.5 QB sacks (-36 yds)... 3 FFs, 1 FR, 2 PBU... Big South Defensive Player of the Year ... Led nation (I-AA) with 22.5 tackles for loss ... Had a career-high 86 tackles and seven sacks as well as three forced fumbles ... Had 14 hits, six tackles for loss and two sacks at No. 25 Hampton ... Had nine tackles and rushed for three touchdowns against SE Louisiana ... A two-way player (Offense/fullback - Defensive/line) ... Also had 12 quarterback pressures ... Of his 17 carries on offense, eight went for touchdowns and six went for first downs.

Beck, a senior, from Mount Hermon, California, recorded 135 tackles with 18.5 TFLs (-78 yds) including 5.5 QB sack (-56 yds)... 6 FF, 9 PBU, 4 INT (108 yds 2 TDs)... Cal Poly's leading tackler all four years; holds school records for single-game, single-season and career tackles; Great West Conference Defensive Player of the Year in 2004; NCAA Division I-AA Independents Defensive Player of the Year in 2003; all-conference honors all four years (all-independents 2001-03, all-Great West in 2004).

Doughty, a junior, from Johnstown, Colorado, recorded 116 tackles with 6 TFLs (-21 yds) including 1.0 QB sack (-5 yds)... 2 FF, 1 FR, 5 PBUs, 6 INTs (33 yds) 2 blocked punts... Named first-team all-Great West FB Conference as a defensive back ... ranked No. 4 in the conference in tackles/game (10.5/game) ... ranked second in the league in interceptions (6) ... Earned Great West Defensive Player of the Week honors (9/6) ... notched 17 tackles, two interceptions and a forced fumble in the Bears' 15-13 win over North Dakota State (9/4) ... intercepted a third pass in the game as the Bison were attempting to tie the game with a two-point conversion with just over a minute to play, however, the NCAA does not consider conversion interceptions official stats ... also named 2nd-Team Academic All-American.

The Rimington Trophy** will present an award to the top center in NCAA 1-AA. This year the highest rated center in voting was **Rob Hunt**, a senior, from Cavalier, North Dakota, Selected to play in Hula Bowl Maui All-Star Football Classic on Jan. 22, 2005 at War Memorial Stadium...Named to the 2004 All-Great West Football Conference first team by coaches and media...Named 2004 Great West Football Conference Offensive Lineman of the Year by media...Completed the 2004 season with a string of 42 consecutive starts...Did not allow a sack over past two seasons...Allowed only one QB hit over past two seasons...He did not miss a start during his collegiate career, even while wearing a cast on his snapping hand in 2003... Started all 11 games as a center and team captain...Did not allowed a sack this season...Allowed no QB hits...Graded out at 93.5 during season with 72 pancake blocks...Bison rushed for 192.4 yards per game and is averaging 378.5 yards of total offense.

This marks the 17th year *Don Hansen's Football Gazette*, a recognized authority on small college football, with a committee of five, this year, has selected an NCAA 1-AA All-America team. A total of 95 players have earned some form of *Football Gazette* All-America accolades.

Mickey Matthews, led James Madison University to the NCAA 1-AA National Championship in 2004 by defeating Montana, 31-21 in the title game. After a 6-6 season in 2003, he led his Dukes to a 13-2 record in 2004, including a first place finish in the Atlantic-10 conference South Division.

The Rimington Trophy website is located at <http://www.rimingtontrophy.com> Esiason, a high-octane Maryland quarterback, and Rimington, a nonpareil center for Nebraska, were NFL teammates at Cincinnati in the mid-1980s. In 1993, Esiason created the New York City based foundation that bears his name to raise funds for the treatment and research of cystic fibrosis.
